

COATOLOGY: SURVIVAL OF THE FLUFF

DESHEDDING: LONG DOUBLE COATS




Breed Examples: Golden Retrievers, Huskies, Newfoundlands, Great Pyrenees, Shelties, Australian Shepherds

Coat types: Long Double Coats

Heavy Shed Seasons: March- June, September-November

Frequency: Slicker Brush- 2-3 times a week
Rake- Once a week, 2-3 times a week during heavy shedding seasons



Tools Needed:



Slicker Brush



Rakes



Leave-In Conditioner

Long double-coated breeds can be tricky to maintain because they shed a lot and can easily mat if not cared for properly. Using the right tools, shampoos/conditioners, and a consistent brushing routine makes a huge difference in managing shedding and keeping their coat from matting. These breeds also go through heavier shedding seasons in the spring and fall—this is when they shed their thick winter undercoats, meaning you'll notice a lot more fluff than usual.

Remember: always brush in the direction the coat grows



1. Spray the coat with the leave in conditioner. (lightly mist, do not saturate coat)



2. Use the slicker brush to brush through the entire coat, removing undercoat. (No more than 30 minutes)



3. Use the rake with short strokes and medium pressure to pull out extra undercoat. (once a week, 2-3 during heavy shedding seasons)
